THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, the Knox County Board of Supervisors directs the Knox County Clerk to create a new fund in the 2020/2021 Knox County budget to be called the DIVERSION PROGRAM FUND with the fund number of 2355 and department number of 652, that all Diversion fees received be remitted to the Knox County Treasurer to be deposited into the DIVERSION PROGRAM FUND, that all purchases and expenditures be made through the claims process, and that the 2020/2021 Knox County Budget that was adopted on September 10, 2020 be amended as per Nebraska Revised Statute §13-511 to show the creation of the DIVERSION PROGRAM FUND noting that the 2020 Knox County tax rate will remain at 0.162297.

The Knox County Board of Supervisors reconvened at 10:07 a.m. with all members present except Supr. James Sokol. Jr., District #4.

Antelope County Commissioner Dean Smith, Antelope Road Supt. Aaron Boggs, JEO representative Brian McDonald and Road employee Casey Diettrich met with the Board to discuss a bridge on the Antelope/Knox County line where the east abutment was washed out by the 2019 flood. Discussion continued on repairing the bridge compared to replacement, FEMA funds allotted with Knox County and Antelope County splitting the costs of approximately \$14,500, some property owners in the area have land lock as the bridge is not open, the road is a low volume road, possibility of putting in a narrower bridge, and the need for an interlocal agreement. Motion by Supr. Schlote, seconded by Supr. Borgmann to approve the replacement of a truss bridge on the Antelope/Knox County line, the counties to split the remaining costs after FEMA pays 75% and NEMA pays 12.5%, the replacement bridge to be a 24 ft. x 150 ft. bridge and Antelope and Knox Counties enter into an interlocal agreement for the project. By roll call vote. Ayes Districts #1, #2, #3, #5, #6 and #7. Nays none. Absent District #4. Motion carried.

Tyler Wolf with Nebraska Game and Parks met with the Board to discuss mowing of the Rec Road. The Nebraska Game and Parks will continue mowing their frontage areas. Mr. Wolf said that adjacent landowners are supposed to mow the road sides but that isn't going to happen as not everyone lives here. Also, he added that it is a liability and risk for the Nebraska Game and Parks if they continue to mow the road sides. Discussion was held on options of possibly hiring someone to mow the road or the County renting a tractor and purchasing a mower so the County could mow the road. More research will be done.

Travis Barney met with the Board regarding the approach road to his proposed subdivision/development. Also present was Herrick Township Clerk Rick Stewart. The .30-mile road leading into the area is currently a Herrick Township minimum maintenance road. Discussion ensued on getting the road back to standard for local classification, maintenance of the road currently has been done by Herrick Township and Frankfort Township, adding rock to the base and pulling in the shoulders of the road, process to reclassify the road, maintenance of the roads/streets in the proposed subdivision that will also be located in Frankfort and North Frankfort Townships, a homeowner association will be formed, and Herrick Township doesn't have the money or budget to fix the road. Mr. Barney said he would fix the road and would take care of the snow removal, but he would have to have the tax benefit/tax dollars if the township won't do it with the same condition on the roads/streets in the subdivision that lays across the three townships. Herrick Township Clerk Stewart said that Herrick Township has a gentleman's agreement that the tax money the township receives from the Kohles Acres subdivision is given back to the subdivision as it maintains the roads/streets within the subdivision. Further discussion was held on the possibility of the County winging the snow at the entrance and that an agreement is needed from the three townships regarding the funds and road maintenance.

At 11:15 a.m., Chairman Mackeprang opened the advertised public hearing on Amended Conditional Use Permit #CU0040A for Wolf Run Resort.

Tom Domanski with the Nebraska Department of Revenue met with the Board to discuss campers situated for extended periods of time at campgrounds in the lake area. Discussion was held on the following: people are buying large campers and parking them in the leased campground lots with many not registered with the County Treasurer; non-payment of taxes or annual registrations; people are pouring concrete, building lean-twos or decks, a bar, a porch and other additions that are not being taxed; there is an increase of campgrounds/RV parks subdivisions in the lake area; that the camper must be titled where it has situs for the majority of the year; who would be in charge of enforcement; that campground owners should possibly include in their leases that all campers must be registered and licensed annually with the County Treasurer; possibly taxing the landowners who lease campground areas; types of campers; classification if the campers are considered real estate if situated for extended times; dated photos could be taken to show if campers are parked for more than thirty days; and sending letters to explain the law. Mr. Domanski said that he will discuss the matter with the Department of Revenue so assistance can be given to the County.

The Knox County Board of Supervisors reconvened at 12:45 p.m. with all members present.

Hwy. Supt. Barta updated the Board on the Prischman Bridge FEMA project. Chairman Mackeprang signed a contract with Dixon Construction Co. of Correctionville IA who had been approved by the Board at the March 11, 2021 meeting for the replacement of the Verdigre Southwest C005402105P Prischman Bridge.

The Board discussed the Biden Administration 30 x 30 plan. More research will be done before the Board makes a decision on the matter.

County Attorney Thomas and Deputy County Attorney Holecek updated the Board on the following: 1. A person has been hired to fill the office clerk position; 2. Update on the SID #2 lawsuit. The Supreme Court gave their opinion that vacated the judgment of the District Court and remanded the cause with directions to dismiss the cause without prejudices for failure to join indispensable parties. WHEREAS, the County of Knox contains about 729,600 total acres of land situated in Northeast Nebraska; and WHEREAS, the County of Knox contains about 11,243.66 acres of WRP land, 2,059.65 acres of State Park, 329 acres of Conservation Easement Acres, 26,905 acres of CRP, as well as 25,350.31 acres of tribal, state rec and take land; and

WHEREAS, designating lands as wilderness does not assure its preservation. Left in an undisturbed or natural state, these lands are highly susceptible to wildland wildfires, insect infestation and disease, all of which degrades the natural and human environment; and WHEREAS, the well-being, health, safety, welfare, economic condition, and culture of the County, its business and its citizens depend on private land ownership and the use of these resources; and

WHEREAS, many of Knox County's businesses and its citizens are involved in or otherwise depend on industries that utilize private lands and their resources, including livestock grazing, crop production, recreational industries, hunting and other outdoor recreation; and WHEREAS, these industries are important components of the Nebraska economy, and are major contributors to the economic and social wellbeing of Knox County and its citizens; and

WHEREAS, on January 27, 2021, President Joseph R. Biden, Jr., issued Executive Order 14008 entitled Tackling the Climate Crisis at Home and Abroad (86 Fed. Reg. 7,619); and

WHEREAS, in Section 216 of Executive Order 14008, President Biden directed the Secretary of the Interior, in consultation with the Secretary of Agriculture and other senior officials, to develop program to conserve at least 30 percent of the lands and waters in the United States by 2030, which is called the "30 x 30" program; and

WHEREAS, under the 30 x 30 program, some 680 million acres of our Nation's lands would be set aside and permanently preserved in its natural state, preventing the productive use of these lands and their resources; and

WHEREAS, there is no constitutional or statutory authority for the President, the Department of the Interior, the Department of Agriculture, or any other federal agency to set aside and permanently preserve 30 percent of all land and water in the United States, and no suchauthority is reference in Executive Order 14008; and

WHEREAS, placing private lands into permanent conservation status will cause dramatic and irreversible harm to the economies of many states, including Nebraska, and in particular rural counties, such as Knox County, whose citizens depend on private lands for their livelihoods; and

WHEREAS, Executive Order 14008 at 216(a) directs the Secretary of the Interior, in consultation with other relevant federal agencies to "submit a report to the Task Force within 90 days of the date of this order recommending steps that the United States should take, working with State, local, Tribal and territorial governments, agricultural and forest landowners, fisherman and other key stakeholders, to achieve the goal of conserving at least 30 percent of ourland and waters by 2030."

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the Board of Supervisors of Knox County, Nebraska, as follows:

- 1. The Board opposes the 30 x 30 program, including its objective of permanently preserving 30 percent of the Nation's lands in its natural state by 2030, or any similar program that will set aside and prevent the productive use of millions of acres of our lands.
- 2. The Board further opposes the designation of lands in Knox County as wilderness, wilderness study areas, wildlife preserves, open space, or other conservation land, thereby restricting public access to such lands and preventing the development and productive use of theresources on or within such lands.
- 3. The Board supports the continued private ownership of land in the County, recognizing the Nation's need for domestic sources of minerals, energy, timber, food and fiber.
- 4. The Board recognizes and supports the State of Nebraska's water rights system, and other state laws and programs governing water rights and water use and opposes any federal designation of waters and

- watercourses within the County that would impair or restrict water diversions and uses authorized under Nebraska law.
- 5. The Board supports reasonable national, regional and global greenhouse gas emissions policies and goals that are comprehensive, practical, cost-effective and do not unnecessarily single out specific industries or activities but opposes the use of global climate change as an excuse to set aside large tracts of land as preserves or open spaces to fulfill that 30 x30 program's objectives.
- 6. The Board also maintains that any lands or other rights that are acquired to fulfill the 30 x 30 program's objectives should be acquired only from willing landowners and for the payment of full and fair market value for all rights and interests acquired, and not through regulatory compulsion, and only after analyzing and considering the impacts of such land acquisitions on the well-being, health, safety, welfare, economy and culture of Knox County, its businesses, and its citizens. The Board also maintains that any lands put under conservation easement will make payments to Knox County equal to what the property taxes would be if this land was still in private ownership and management, considering the highest land use.
- 7. The Board shall send a copy of this Resolution to the Department of Interior and allother relevant Federal and State agencies.

RESOLUTION #2021 - 22

WHEREAS, a historic bridge known as the Verdigre North Federal Aid Bridge Project, BRO-7054(19), CN 31821 located on 885 Road across the Verdigre Creek will be replaced, and

WHEREAS, Knox County, Nebraska, has three permanent easements for road and bridge purposes covering 2.33 acres recorded on July 23, 2019 at Deed Book 145, pages 444-447, pages 448-451, and pages 452-455, and

WHEREAS, Knox County needs to transfer these three easements back to Duane R. Liska and Peggy S. Liska, in order to obtain the same property in fee, that is, absolute ownership, in order to meet requirements of the Wetlands Reserve Program, and as administered by the Nation Resource Conservation Services (NRCS) of the Unites States Department of Agriculture, and

WHEREAS, the Chairman of the Knox County Board of Supervisors is authorized and directed to make, execute, and deliver a quitclaim deed to those three easements to Duane R. Liska and Peggy S. Liska, husband and wife, and

WHEREAS, the County of Knox, a political subdivision of the State of Nebraska, also referred to as Knox County, with assistance from the Nebraska Department of Transportation (hereinafter referred to as NDOT) will acquire in fee title, a 2.33-acre part of the property from Liskas needed to construct, operate and maintain the new County road bridge replacing the obsolete existing county road bridge, and

WHEREAS, to complete construction of the Project, Knox County will also acquire from the Liskas a temporary construction easement and slope easement of 1.19 acres, for temporary use during construction, in addition to the 2.33 acres acquired in fee but located within the 468.10 acres described in a Wetland Reserve Program easement deed recorded in Book 133, pages 201-219 of the Deed Records of Knox County, and

WHEREAS, Knox County needs the consent of the Liskas and the United States to acquire fee ownership of the 2.33 acres and modification of the Wetlands Reserve Program Warranty Deed Easements, and

WHEREAS, Knox County needs to agree to the subordination conditions of the United States to obtain the consent of the United States, and

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that the Chairman of the Knox County Board of Supervisors is authorized and designated to execute all documents necessary or proper to the following subordinate conditions:

- a. Knox County's fee acquisition for County Road right-of-way, as set forth in the County Road Project Instrument and the Temporary Construction Easement, is comprised of a fee acquisition for County Road right-of-way and a temporary construction workspace.
- b. The fee acquisition for County Road right-of-way granted to Knox County by the Liskas as filed of record and referenced above, is an approximate 85 feet wide permanent servitude to be used as a County road right-of-way.
- c. The United States subordinates the Wetlands Reserve Program easement, as provided in the Warranty Easement Deed, to the fee acquisition for County Road right-of-way of Knox County no greater than what is described in those instruments, a strip of land 85 feet wide, being situated in that certain lot, tract or parcel of land situated in Section 17, Township 31 North, Range 6 West, West of the 6th Principal Meridian, Knox County, Nebraska and marked as "Exhibit B" and incorporated herein as though set forth word by word.
- d. Furthermore, Knox County's aforesaid temporary construction workspace will be limited to the are as described in "Exhibit C".
- e. The sole purpose of the subordination by the United States, as set forth in this Subordination Agreement, is to allow Knox County to construct, reconstruct, operate, maintain, inspect, repair, or replace a County bridge and connecting roadway.
- f. The aforesaid County bridge and connecting roadway shall be constructed so as not to materially interfere with the rights, title, and interests that the United States acquired under the Warranty Easement Deed.
- g. After completion of the construction phase of the aforesaid County bridge and connecting roadway, Knox County shall only have the rights of ingress and egress over and across lands under aforesaid right-of-way.
- h. Knox County shall only use the aforesaid temporary construction workspace during the construction phase of the aforesaid County bridge and connecting roadway project.
- i. Knox County agrees to reasonably repair any damages which may arise to vegetative cover resulting from the construction, maintenance and operation of it's the aforesaid roadway and bridge.
- j. Knox County recognizes the Rights of the United States including the right to impound water over the right-ofway, and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that Knox County will use all reasonable efforts to comply with all material requirements as set forth in the Restoration Agreement between the United States and with the material terms of the Indemnification and Resource Protection Agreement to be executed by Knox County, and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the Warranty Easement Deed in "Exhibit A" will remain in full force and effect subject only to the rights of Knox County acquired under the County Road Project Instrument and the Temporary Construction Easement as modified by the Subordination Conditions.

Krista Nix with the County Clerk's Office and County Clerk Fischer presented the updates to the Knox County proposed 2021/2022 budget where accommodation was added for anticipated grants noting that this will not change the proposed tax request of \$3,623,458.91 which is nearly \$27,000 less than last year. The proposed levy is slightly lower being 0.161837 compared to last year's levy of 0.162297. Motion by Supr. Schlote, seconded by Supr. Sokol, Jr. to approve the changes to the proposed Knox County 2021/2022 budget draft showing that with the drop of the valuation of over \$10.1 million the proposed budget still shows a decrease of nearly \$27,000 for the tax request and the proposed levy to be slightly lower than the 2020 levy. By roll call vote. Ayes all Districts. Nays none. Motion carried. The 2021/2022 Budget hearing and the 2021 Levy hearing will be held on September 9, 2021 beginning at 9:00 a.m.

Ariel Larsen with the North Central District Health Department updated the Board on the alcohol and tobacco compliance checks done in Knox County recently. In Knox County, all twenty-six alcohol vendors checked passed but three out of twenty-three checks for tobacco sale compliance failed. Also presented was the information "Cannabis on the Youth Brain". Attempts to legalize marijuana in Nebraska continues.

Deputy County Clerk Rhonda Surface and SLFRF Administrator Krista Nix updated the Board on quotes for laptops. The ARPA funds can be used for laptops or other equipment that may be needed to do County work from home due to allow telework in case of a COVID outbreak. Some of the current computers need updated programing or need to be replaced. Quotes for Dell laptops were received from Applied Connective Technologies in the amount of \$915 and from PrecisionIT in the amount of \$919. Discussion was held on the process of who has final approval of using the ARPA funds. The Board decided the SLFRF Committee will review and present recommendations to the County Board for their final approval. The Board did approve the purchase of eight laptop computers from Applied Connective Technologies in the amount of \$915 each along with docking stations with the possibility of a Dell deal registration savings discount with the costs to be paid from the ARPA funds.

Deputy County Clerk Surface updated the Board on the NIRMA Cybersecurity training held on August 25. The Board had made it mandatory that all officials/department heads and employees attend the training and those who did not had to have an approved absence from the Board. A number of the Sheriff's Office employees had already taken the training in February 2021, so they did not have to attend this training. Those officials and employees who had been excused from the August 25 training will have to take the training on either of two dates available in September. The consensus of the attendees was that it was a very good training.

Long time County Treasurer Cathy Stark submitted to the Board her letter of retirement effective September 30, 2021 and her recommendation that Deputy County Treasurer Lori Ebel be appointed to complete the term that expires January 2023. Mrs. Stark has worked in the County Treasurer's Office over the course of 43 years with 34 of those years being the Knox County Treasurer. Deputy County Treasurer Lori Ebel submitted her letter of formal application for appointment to the Knox County Treasurer's position. Mrs. Ebel has been employed in the County Treasurer's Office for 38 years with 34 years as Deputy. The Board commended County Treasurer Stark for her dedicated service to Knox County. As per Nebraska Revised Statute 32-563, when a vacancy occurs before the election of a successor, the functions of the County office shall be exercised by appointment of the deputy if there is one. Motion by Supr, O'Connor, seconded by Supr. Borgmann to accept the retirement letter of long time Knox County Treasurer Stark with such retirement effective September 30, 2021 and to appoint Deputy Knox County Treasurer Lori Ebel to the position of Knox County Treasurer effective October 1, 2021 to complete the term ending January 2023. Officials' updates were as follows: 1. Emergency Manager Hintz updated the Board on the increasing COVID numbers in the North Central District Health Department; 2. A week-long study will be done at the Ponca Tribe Headquarters in Niobrara during the second week in October and the public is invited to participate. Suggestions from this study session will be submitted to the State Senators.

- 5. Based on the proposed property tax request and changes in other revenue, the operating budget of Knox County will be \$25,760,131.16 (does not include \$1,100,000 for cash reserve in the General Fund), which exceeds last fiscal year's operating budget by 10.04%.
- 6. The cash reserve for the General Fund will remain at \$1,100,000.00.
- 7. A copy of this resolution be certified and forwarded to the Knox County Clerk on or before October 14, 2021.

<u>Introductory Employee</u>. A new employee who has not yet completed the County's introductory period. (Introductory employees are not eligible for any County benefits), as further explained in the County's explanation of benefits found later in this handbook.

BENEFITS

Pg. 20 – Workers' Compensation Benefits

The following paragraphs were added to clarify Workers' Compensation Benefits:

An employee receiving workers' compensation benefits in an amount determined by the workers' compensation laws in effect at the time of injury or disability will only receive payment from workers' compensation. Any employee-withheld insurances must be paid by the employee directly to the insurance company.

An employee receiving workers' compensation benefits cannot earn vacation and/or sick leave.

After an employee has returned to work, any time taken for follow-up medical and/or rehabilitation visits related to workers' compensation will be paid to the employee by workers' compensation. Hourly employees may not use earned sick and/or vacation leave for time taken before or after a follow-up medical and/or rehabilitation visit related to workers' compensation.

Pgs. 23-24 – Vacation

The following paragraph was added to clarify vacation:

Vacation must be taken in lieu of time off without pay. If earned vacation has been exhausted, then vacation becomes leave without pay.

Pgs. 25-26 - Sick Leave

The following paragraph was added to clarify sick leave:

Sick leave must be taken in lieu of time off without pay. If earned sick leave has been exhausted, then sick time becomes leave without pay unless the Knox County Catastrophic Leave Donation Policy applies.

Pg. 24 - Holidays

Changed the following paragraph to remove "at a January meeting" as the Board fixes holidays at a December meeting:

On Arbor Day, the courthouse will be open and County employees will work as an ordinary day. In lieu of Arbor Day, the courthouse will be closed and Knox County employees will have a floating paid holiday, the date of which is to be fixed by the Board at a January meeting.

GENERAL PERSONNEL POLICIES

Pg. 52 – "Use of County Credit Card"

Added the following policy regarding the Use of a County Credit Card (before Reduction in Force): (NOTE: The Personnel System will also be updated to include this policy and add the "AFFIDAVIT FOR UNAVAILABLE OR LOST RECEIPTS" and the "CARDHOLDER AGREEMENT" forms in Section 4 – Hiring, Employment and Separation.)

Use of County Credit Card

The following rules and regulations govern the general use of County credit cards:

- 1. An authorized user of a County Credit Card is the only person who may make a purchase with the card.
- 2. Any purchases made shall only be in connection with County employment.
- 3. No sales tax should be paid on any purchases, excluding meals. If sales tax is paid, then the cardholder is responsible for reimbursement of the sales tax to Knox County, unless purchase was pre-approved by the Purchasing Committee.
- 4. If a Credit Card receipt is lost and cannot be turned into the County Clerk's office, the authorized user will be required to complete an AFFIDAVIT FOR UNAVAILABLE OR LOST RECEIPTS.
- 5. Any misuse of a County Credit Card will result in the revocation of privileges to use the Card. Knox County also retains the right to take further action, whether in the form of disciplinary action, termination of employment, and/or legal prosecution, in the event of misuse and or fraud involving County funds.
- 6. Misuse of a County Credit Card includes the following:
 - a.) Using the Credit Card for personal purchases.
 - b.) Purchase of unauthorized items.
 - c.) Use of the Credit Card by someone other than the authorized user.
 - d.) Fraudulent or inaccurate record keeping.
- 7. An authorized user of a County Credit Card must complete and sign a CARDHOLDER AGREEMENT.
- 8. Upon separation or termination, the authorized user of a County Credit Card must return the Card to the County Clerk's Office where it will be verified that the Card was returned and sign the bottom of the CARDHOLDER AGREEMENT stating that he/she has not and will not record the Credit Card number to make any further purchases on the Card after their final date of employment with Knox County.

WHEREAS, redistricting of the Knox County Supervisor Districts was necessary after the 2020 U.S. Census results were released, and

WHEREAS, the Santee Sioux Nation Reservation in Harrison, Hill, Spade and Union Townships and the Northern Ponca Tribal Areas in the Niobrara and Raymond Townships are too large in population to be in one Supervisor District, and

WHEREAS, the Santee Sioux Nation Reservation should be entirely in one Supervisor District, and

WHEREAS, the Northern Ponca Tribal Areas in Niobrara and Raymond Townships should be entirely in one Supervisor District, and

WHEREAS, the Supervisor Districts shall be equal in population, the target population of each District is computed by dividing the total Knox County population as per the 2020 U.S. Census of 8,391 between the seven Supervisor Districts for a target number of 1,199 persons per District, there cannot be a variance of more than 5% above or below the target amount, there can be no more than two Supervisor Districts in one voting precinct and a census block cannot be divided between two Supervisor Districts, and

WHEREAS, gWorks using the 2020 U.S. Census data has worked with the Knox County Clerk and the Knox County Board of Supervisors extensively for numbers to produce fair and correct Supervisor Districts, and

NOW, THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED, the attached Proposal #9 map is approved and adopted as the Knox County Supervisor Districts effective for candidates to file beginning January 5, 2022 with the Supervisor District boundaries to be revised as follows:

- 1. The boundaries of Supervisor District #1 of Knox County, Nebraska include the following described territory: Sections 1 through 16, Sections 23 and 24, that portion of Section 25 lying north of Knox Avenue and south of Highway 12, and the incorporated City of Crofton located in parts of Sections 24, 25 and 26 in Eastern Township; all of Frankfort Township; and all of North Frankfort Township. District #1 contains 1,166 persons more or less according to the 2020 Census of population by the United States Census Bureau. All of District #1 is in the voting precinct of Crofton Area.
- 2. The boundaries of Supervisor District #2 of Knox County, Nebraska include the following described territory: All of Addison Township; all of Harrison Township; all of Herrick Township; all of Hill Township including the incorporated Village of Santee; Sections 13 through 36 of Niobrara Township lying south of Highway 12 LESS the incorporated Village of Niobrara located in Sections 16 and 17; all of Spade Township; and all of Union Township. The Santee Sioux Nation Reservation will be entirely in District #2. District #2 contains 1,223 persons more or less according to the 2020 Census of population by the United States Census Bureau. Addison, Harrison, Herrick, Hill, Spade and Union Townships are located in the newly redistricted voting precinct of Lindy/Santee/Center Area. Sections 13 through 36 of Niobrara Township lying south of Highway 12 LESS the incorporated Village of Niobrara located in Sections 16 and 17 is located in the newly redistricted voting precinct of Niobrara Area.
- 3. The boundaries of Supervisor District #3 of Knox County, Nebraska include the following described territory: All of Central Township; all of Cleveland Township; Sections 1 through 18, Sections 23 through 26, and Sections 35 and 36 in Creighton Township including the incorporated Village of Bazile Mills; all of Jefferson Township; all of Logan Township; all of Miller Township including the incorporated Village of Winnetoon; Sections 6 through 8 and Sections 16 through 36 in Morton Township; all of Valley Township including the incorporated Village of Center; Sections 7 and 8 lying south of 881 RD, Sections 9 through 12 south of Highway 84 and all of Sections 13 through 36 in Verdigre Township LESS the incorporated Village of Verdigre; all of Walnut Grove Township; all of Washington Township; and all of Western Township. District #3 contains 1,155 persons more or less according to the 2020 Census of population by the United States Census Bureau. Central and Valley Townships are located in the newly redistricted voting precinct of Lindy/Santee/Center Area. Cleveland Township is located in the newly redistricted voting precinct of Bloomfield Area. Sections 1 through 18, Sections 23 through 26,



All of Sections 8 through 12 and those portions of Sections 13 through 17 lying north of Highway 12 in Niobrara Township including the incorporated Village of Niobrara and all of Raymond Township including the incorporated Village of Verdel are located in the newly redistricted voting precinct of Niobrara Area. Bohemia and Sparta Townships, and Sections 1 through 4 and portions of Sections 9 and 10 lying north of Highway 84 and Sections 5 and 6 lying north of 881 RD in Verdigre Township including the incorporated Village of Verdigre are located in the newly redistricted voting precinct of Verdigre Area.
- 5. The boundaries of Supervisor District #5 of Knox County, Nebraska include the following described territory: All of Peoria Township, and Sections 1 through 5 and Sections 9 through 15 in Morton Township including the incorporated City of Bloomfield. District #5 contains 1,206 persons more or less according to the 2020 Census of population by the United States Census Bureau. All of District #5 is located in the voting precinct of Bloomfield Area.
- 6. The boundaries of Supervisor District #6 of Knox County, Nebraska include the following described territory: All of Columbia Township; all of Dolphin Township; all of Dowling Township; all of Lincoln Township including the incorporated Village of Wausa; and Sections 17 through 22, and Sections 25 through 36 in Eastern Township LESS that portion of Section 25 lying north of Knox Avenue and south of Highway 12, and LESS the incorporated City of Crofton located in parts of Sections 24, 25 and 26 in Eastern Township. District #6 contains 1,192 persons more or less according to the 2020 Census of population by the United States Census Bureau. WHEREAS, the duly appointed Planning Commission of Knox County, Nebraska, with the assistance of its consultant Marvin Planning Consultants, has prepared an amendment to the Zoning Regulations for Knox County, Nebraska; and

WHEREAS, the Planning Commission has given public notice as required by the Nebraska State Statutes, of a hearing held on the 14th day of October, 2021, continued until the 28th day of October, 2021, at the Knox County Courthouse on the proposed amendment; and

WHEREAS, the public hearing has been held pursuant to said notice and all statements received at the hearing have been duly considered by the planning commission;

AND WHEREAS the Knox County Planning Commission has reviewed the amendment and make recommendation to the Knox County Board of Supervisors for approval;

THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED BY THE KNOX COUNTY BOARD OF SUPERVISORS, THAT THE FOLLOWING AMENDMENT OF SECTION 8.04 BE APPROVED AND ADOPTED:

KNOX COUNTY ZONING REGULATIONS

Section 8.04 Recreational Vehicle Parks

No Recreational Vehicle Park shall be constructed within the zoning jurisdiction of Knox County unless a Conditional Use permit is approved and issued by the County and is constructed in conformance with the following requirements:

- 1. The tract to be used as a recreational vehicle park or campground shall not be less than two acres in area. Under no circumstances shall a manufactured home be parked in a recreational vehicle park or campground.
- 2. The maximum number of recreational vehicles, trailers, or camp sites shall be 15 per acre.
- 3. Each recreational vehicle camp site shall be plainly marked by number.
- 4. The minimum dimensions of a recreational vehicle, trailer or camp site shall be 25 feet wide by 40 feet long.
- 5. Each recreational vehicle, trailer, camp site shall be separated from other recreational vehicles, trailers, or camp sites by at least 15 feet.
- 6. All recreational vehicle, trailer, camp sites shall meet the required setbacks from roads and from the ordinary high-water mark and shall be located at least 50 feet from exterior lot lines.
 - A. The exterior lot line setback shall be maintained in open space, except that landscaping for the purpose of screening the Park from visual views from adjacent properties.
 - **B.** Screening at least six feet in height shall be provided between the recreational vehicle park or campground and any adjoining residential area.
- 7. The number and location of access drives shall be controlled for traffic safety and protection of surrounding properties; provided:
 - A. No one space shall be designed for direct access to a county road or highway outside the boundaries of the recreational vehicle park or campground;
 - B. All interior access drives shall be at least 20 feet in width;
 - **C.** All interior access drives and parking areas shall be surfaced with gravel, asphalt or other material to free the site of mud.
- 8. All external amenities (porches, screened patios, decks, built-in grills/pizza ovens, and similar) constructed on, relocated to, and placed on a recreational vehicle site or camping site shall require the following:
 - A. A zoning permit from the Knox County Zoning Administrator. Said applicant shall provide proof that the Park owner is aware and approves of said modifications.
 - B. Be considered permanent and said items shall be taxed as improvements to the land. This information shall be provided within the zoning permit and may be verified by any authorized county official.
 - C. An amenity, as described in #8 above, may be located on an individual pad site provided it is designed only to protect occupants from the elements and does not have a permanent water supply or a sewage system facilities.
 - D. All electrical connections shall meet the Nebraska State Electrical Code including waterproofing, ground fault, and other life safety requirements.
 - E. All non-reported improvements shall be subject to all penalties allowed.
 - F. All recreational vehicles in a recreational vehicle park shall be properly licensed.
- 9. There shall be two off-street parking spaces per each individual recreational vehicle, trailer, camp site.
- 10. Each pad location shall be equipped with the following:
 - A. Electrical outlet
 - B. A sanitary sewer connection per Nebraska NDEE requirements
 - **C.** A potable water connection per Nebraska HHS requirements
 - D. If pad sites are not supplied with individual sanitary sewer and water connections then:
 - 1) A dump station for recreational vehicles shall be supplied per Nebraska NDEE requirements.
 - 2) A "Community Building" shall be constructed to the following requirements:
 - a. Pads shall not be located more than 300 feet from the "Community Building"
 - b. Separate toilet, lavatory, and shower facilities for each sex, in the following ratio: one flush-type toilet, one lavatory and one shower or bathtub for females and one flush-type toilet, one lavatory, and one shower or bathtub for males.
 - c. The pervious toilet sanitary standards shall be for every 30 pad sites.
 - d. Have an accessible, adequate, safe and potable supply of cold water.

- e. Comply with all Nebraska Building, Electrical and life safety codes.
- f. Be maintained in a clean, sanitary condition and kept free of any condition that is considered a health hazard.
- 11. Other criteria that shall be met include:
 - A. No more than one wheeled recreational vehicle or trailer shall be allowed on any individual pad site. In addition to these units, a tent may be erected to serve as an auxiliary shelter, but it shall not be erected for more than 14 consecutive days.
 - B. Wheels and tires shall remain in the in-transit position.
 - **C.** A recreational dwelling may only be skirted with lattice, solid skirting may be installed immediately adjacent to the tires.
 - **D.** Identify a Fire Safety Plan/Emergency Plan (approved by the local rural fire department) in the event of a man-made or natural disaster.
- 12. One permanent dwelling unit may be constructed within the Recreational Vehicle Park and is to be used strictly by the park owner and family or the resident superintendent.

RESOLUTION #2021-53 A RESOLUTION ESTABLISHING SALARIES FOR THE ELECTED OFFICIALS OF KNOX COUNTY NEBRASKA

WHEREAS, pursuant to Section 23-1114 of the Revised Statutes of the State of Nebraska, the Knox County Board of Supervisors are required to determine and set the salaries of the various elected officials of the County prior to January 15th of the year in which a General Election will be held for the respective offices,

WHEREAS, the Knox County Board of Supervisors, have met in order to establish the salaries for the elected officials of Knox County, Nebraska, for the term commencing January 2023, pursuant to Nebraska law. After conferring with county officials and citizens, and after reviewing the financial situation of county government, the Board finds it is necessary and proper to establish new salaries for the elected officials of Knox County, Nebraska.

NOW, THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED, by the County Board of Supervisors of Knox County, Nebraska, that:

County Assessor. The annual salary for the office of County Assessor shall be established at \$69,300 for the calendar year 2023. For each year thereafter \$2,000 shall be added to the previous year's salary so the total amount for the calendar year 2024 shall be \$71,300, for the calendar year 2025 shall be \$73,300, and for the calendar year 2026 shall be \$75,300.

County Attorney. The annual salary for the office of County Attorney shall be established at \$69,300 for the calendar year 2023. For each year thereafter \$2,000 shall be added to the previous year's salary so the total amount for the calendar year 2024 shall be \$71,300, for the calendar year 2025 shall be \$73,300, and for the calendar year 2026 shall be \$75,300.

County Clerk. The annual salary for the office of County Clerk shall be established at \$69,300 for the calendar year 2023. For each year thereafter \$2,000 shall be added to the previous year's salary so the total amount for the calendar year 2024 shall be \$71,300, for the calendar year 2025 shall be \$73,300, and for the calendar year 2026 shall be \$75,300.

Clerk of District Court. The annual salary for the office of Clerk of District Court shall be established at \$69,300 for the calendar year 2023. For each year thereafter \$2,000 shall be added to the previous year's salary so the total amount for the calendar year 2024 shall be \$71,300, for the calendar year 2025 shall be \$73,300, and for the calendar year 2026 shall be \$75,300.

County Sheriff. The annual base salary for the office of County Sheriff shall be established at \$69,300 with the addition of \$8,400 per year to manage the county jail for a total of \$77,700 for the calendar year 2023. For each year thereafter \$2,000 shall be added to the previous year's salary so the total amount for the calendar year 2024 shall be \$79,700, for the calendar year 2025 shall be \$81,700, and for the calendar year 2026 shall be \$83,700. In the event the County enters into a contract with a city or village to provide contract law enforcement, the Sheriff will receive an additional salary of \$500 per city or village, not to exceed \$1,000 per month.

County Surveyor. The annual salary for the office of County Surveyor shall be established at \$1,500 for the calendar year 2023, 2024, 2025, and 2026.

County Treasurer. The annual salary for the office of County Treasurer shall be established at \$69,300 for the calendar year 2023. For each year thereafter \$2,000 shall be added to the previous year's salary so the total amount for the calendar year 2024 shall be \$71,300, for the calendar year 2025 shall be \$73,300, and for the calendar year 2026 shall be \$75,300.

County Supervisor. The annual salary for the office of County Supervisor shall be established at 40% of the annual salary of the offices of County Assessor, County Attorney, County Clerk, County Clerk of District Court, County Sheriff and County Treasurer, that is, at \$27,720 for the calendar year 2023. For each year thereafter \$800 shall be added to the previous year's salary so the total amount for the calendar year 2024 shall be \$28,520, for the calendar year 2025 shall be \$29,320, and for the calendar year 2026 shall be \$30,120.

Chairman of the Board of County Supervisors. The annual salary for the Chairman of the Board of County Supervisors shall be established at \$28,920 for the calendar year 2023. For each year thereafter \$800 shall be added to the previous year's salary so the total amount for the calendar year 2024 shall be \$29,720, for the calendar year 2025 shall be \$30,520, and for the calendar year 2026 shall be \$31,320.

Deputies. The salaries of the Deputies of the County Assessor, the County Clerk, the County Clerk of the District Court and the County Treasurer shall be at least 77% of the respective elected officials because deputies occasionally put in overtime, work as election workers in the County Clerk's Office on election nights or may work in other capacities for Knox County and would receive wages in addition to their original salaries. The salary of the Deputy County Attorney shall be 40% of the County Attorney's.

Benefits. In addition to the above salary each Elected Official shall receive during his or her term of office a single health insurance coverage policy, a single dental/vision insurance coverage policy and a \$15,000 life insurance policy. If the County offers full family to employees, the same will be available for Elected Officials and Supervisors. Elected officials shall be enrolled in and shall receive the benefits of the County Employee's Retirement System, to participate in such programs on the effective date of such programs as approved by the County Board.

Cash in Lieu of Health Insurance. In addition to the above stated salary, an elected official shall receive during his or her term of office at county expense an opt-out provision (aka "cash in lieu of" provisions) if an elected official opts out of the health and medical plan. This option will be available as permitted by Federal and State statutes and rules and regulations of agencies, including US Department of Treasury, US Internal Revenue Service, Center for Medicare and Medicaid Services (CMS) and US Department of Health and Human Services (HHS). Pursuant to the "cash in lieu of" program, an elected official shall receive "cash in lieu" of health insurance.
